
A patient guide to lymphedema after breast cancer.





What is breast cancer-related lymphedema?



Breast cancer treatment often requires removal of lymph nodes and damage to vessels, preventing lymphatic fluid from draining. This leads to an uncomfortable buildup of fluid in the tissues of the breast, trunk, back, arm or hand.

Of breast cancer survivors, 20-40% will develop lymphedema in the arm while nearly 50% will develop lymphedema in the trunk or breast after treatment.^{1,2} While there is no cure, there are ways to manage its symptoms, enabling patients to get back to the lives they love.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF LYMPHEDEMA



Pain in chest area, burning, aching or tingling



Trunk/back area swelling



Arm swelling, tightness or heaviness with limited movement in shoulder/arm



Hand/finger swelling; tight fitting jewelry/rings

At-home treatment options.

Untreated swelling can cause permanent damage to surrounding tissue and lymph vessels. In addition to in-clinic therapy, symptoms can be managed at home in a number of ways, including:

- Exercise
- Skin care
- Elevating the limb
- Compression sleeve or bandage to limit swelling
- Self massage
- Advanced pneumatic compression device (Flexitouch Plus)


The Flexitouch Plus system gives breast cancer survivors a convenient way to self-manage their lymphedema symptoms. It works by:

Each garment contains air chambers connected to a programmable controller. When activated, these chambers sequentially inflate and deflate, creating gentle waves of pressure. Only one chamber is fully inflated at any one point in time, providing a treatment sequence and duration similar to manual therapy.








