

# What is head and neck lymphedema?

Lymphedema refers to swelling that can occur in any part of the body.

Head and neck cancer treatment often requires removal of lymph nodes and damage to vessels, preventing lymphatic fluid from draining in the affected area. This can lead to internal and external swelling.

While there is presently no cure for lymphedema, it can be managed with early diagnosis and diligent care of your affected area.

#### Signs and symptoms in the head and neck:

- Dysphagia (difficulty swallowing)
- Pain, discomfort, tightness
- Scarring, fibrosis or radiation fibrosis
- Reduced range of motion
- Difficulty breathing
- Internal and external swelling
- Vocal changes or difficulty speaking



### Treatment options.

Lymphedema treatment is often multi-modal and may include:

- Manual lymphatic drainage (MLD) massage by a lymphedema therapist
- Compression garments
- Swallowing exercises
- Physical exercise
- At-home pneumatic compression with the Flexitouch<sup>®</sup> Plus system
